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CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

In all my years of driving this nation's highways, I have never encountered dangerous fog conditions as I did the first Thursday of November. I was down to 30 mph many times that early morning.

Delivering a load of liquid to the south side of Pipestone, Minnesota, the MN Highway Patrol stopped me and told me that I had to take a 12-mile detour because of a fatal accident that happened shortly before. Tragically, one semi had pulled out in front of

another semi, and the second semi's driver was killed. When I passed by the accident scene about an hour later, it looked as though the collision caused a horrendous fire, destroying most of the second semi and trailer. The accident really unnerved me. I relate this story to iterate to all of you and your drivers: Be super careful and alert while driving in adverse conditions, and better yet, stay put until the weather clears. I'm sure the semi companies involved (and their insurors) wish they had, as well. No "hot load" is worth anyone's life.

On a much different note, during many emails among your Association's Exec Committee, an interesting item arose. Your Association's Past Chair Robert Christian gave me permission to paraphrase what has transpired among the Black Hills Log Haulers Association, in which he is very involved.

"The BHLHA was contacted by the timber industry, (Neiman Enterprises) for allegiance and support. The Forest Service is attempting to only release one-half of the timber to be harvested, as their studies have shown that move is necessary to maintain a healthy forest. This decision by the Forest Service will jeopardize another mill and could put the Black Hills Forest in jeopardy of catastrophic fires or another bug infestation. And of much importance, once a mill is shut down, it will be gone forever. I reached out to Christine for SDTA support. Christine, Philip Christian and myself met with Neiman management to discuss the issue. Christine reached out to the contacts she had, met with our Lieutenant Governor, SD Economic Development, some of our Congressional Delegate's offices and everyone else who would listen concerning this danger to our state's logging/lumber mill economy."

I thank Robert, Philip and Christine for being proactive on this issue. I look forward to an update when they hear back from all those contacted.

In next month's article, I will be relating the results of SDTA's annual pheasant hunt and fall board meeting. As they did last year, my son and grandson are traveling from St. Paul to hunt with us. The pheasant hunt is a great way to network with other truckers and industry personnel, and maybe even bag a few birds. If you didn't attend this year, clear your schedule next November and attend the pheasant hunt and board meeting. All members are very welcome to attend both.

Driver Shortage Update 2021

The American Trucking Associations estimates that in 2021 the truck driver shortage will hit a historic high of just over 80,000 drivers. This figure is the difference between the number of drivers currently in the market and the optimal number of drivers based on freight demand.

- While all sectors in the industry struggle with finding enough drivers, the driver shortage is most acute in the longer-haul (i.e., non-local) for-hire truckload market.
- There is no single cause of the driver shortage, but some of the primary factors include:
 - High average age of current drivers, which leads to a high number of retirements;
 - Women making up only 7% of all drivers, well below their representation in the total workforce;
 - Inability of some would-be and current drivers to pass a drug test, a problem exacerbated by an increasing number of states legalizing marijuana (a substance still banned federally);
 - The federally mandated minimum age of 21 to drive commercially across state lines poses a significant challenge to recruiting new drivers;
 - The pandemic caused some drivers to leave the industry, plus truck driver training schools trained far fewer drivers than normal in 2020;
 - o Lifestyle issues, notably time away from home, especially in the longer-haul market;
 - Infrastructure and other issues, like a lack of truck parking spots, which causes drivers to stop
 driving earlier than they need to so they can get a spot for the night, and congestion which limits
 drivers' ability to safely and efficiently make deliveries;
 - Other barriers to entry like inability of potential candidates to meet carriers' hiring standards for driving record or criminal histories.

At current trends, the shortage could surpass 160,000 in 2030. This forecast is based on driver demographic trends, including gender and age, as well as expected freight growth. As part of this study, ATA estimates that over the next decade, the industry will have to recruit nearly 1,000,000 new drivers into the industry to replace retiring drivers, drivers that leave voluntarily (e.g., lifestyle) or involuntarily (e.g., driving records or failed drug test), as well as additional drivers needed for industry growth. These trends do not account for the impact of potential laws that may either alter the industry dynamics positively (e.g., lower the minimum age to drive across state lines) or negatively (e.g. regulatory mandates that push drivers to exit the industry or be less efficient).

Because there is no single cause of the driver shortage, that means there is no single solution. Recently, driver pay and earnings have gone up significantly, for a career that was already a well-paying path to the middle class for Americans without a college degree. Data from the Department of Labor shows that average annual earnings of production and non-supervisory employees, with the vast majority of those being driver occupations, in the long-haul for-hire truckload industry is increasing roughly five times the historical average. While this is good for drivers and those looking to enter this occupation, rising pay rates alone will not solve the driver shortage because some drivers will choose to work less at a higher pay rate, negating the impact of the increase. The solution to the driver shortage will most certainly require increased pay, regulatory changes and modifications to shippers', receivers' and carriers' business practices to improve conditions for drivers.

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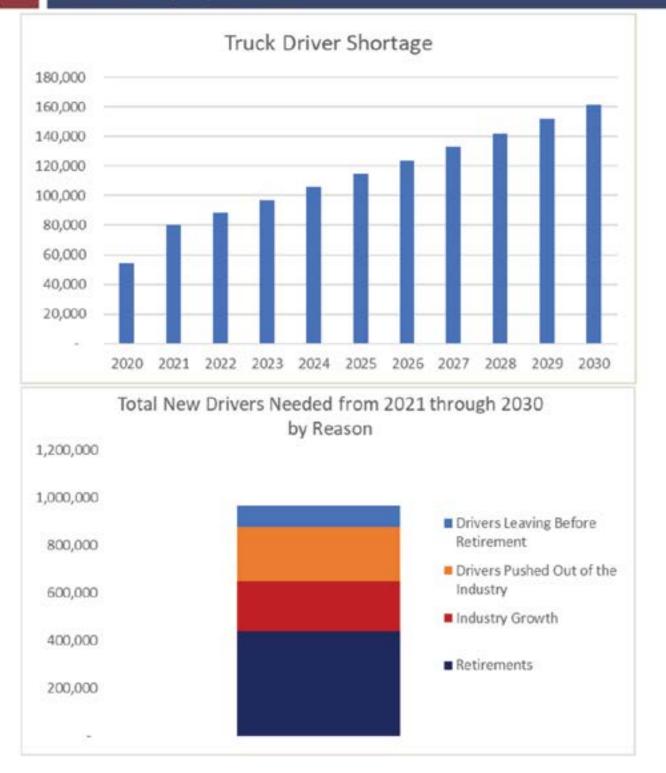

RULES:

Driver may be nominated for Driver of the Month for any outstanding act of heroism, a contribution to highway safety, an extraordinary act of courtesy, an exceptional deed or act of service to mankind within the community reflecting positively on the motor carrier industry, or for a long period of safe and courteous driving. An outstanding act shall be deemed to mean unusual or other than the normal every day courtesies afforded by truck drivers.

Eligibility:

- 1. The nominated driver must be an employee of a member in good standing of the South Dakota Trucking Association.
- 2. The nominated driver must have been an employee by the present employer for at least two years and have a minimum of five years overall experience.
- 3. South Dakota domiciled* drivers are eligible for nomination for an outstanding act performed in any state. * The intent of the word "domiciled" shall be interpreted to mean: Any driver reporting to or regularly dispatched from a terminal within the state of SD (in keeping with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations definition of his/her home terminal) regardless of where the driver may dwell.
- 4. A driver may receive the Driver of the Month award only one time in any contest year. He/she may be renominated in any subsequent year.
- 5. Nominations for outstanding acts on the highway shall be accompanied by supporting evidence (letters, statements, news clippings, etc.). A clear, factual account is absolutely necessary. Vague generalizations will not be accepted.
- 6. A copy of recent driver motor vehicle record check must accompany the nomination.
- 7. Drivers nominated and not selected as Driver of the Month will be held over and used in the following month's selection.
- 8. Entries must be in the SDTA office no later than the 10th of each month for that current month's contest.
- 9. Nominations may be made by any party, but must be approved by the employer or a representative of the employer.
- 10. The annual contest will run from September of the previous year through August of the current year.
- 11. Company agrees to submit a professional head and shoulders photo of the winning driver.

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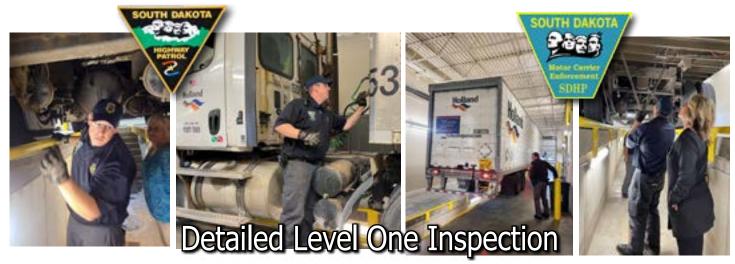

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ELECTRONIC LOGGING DEVICES

Mobile Carriers Are Sunsetting 3G Soon. Will your ELD be affected?

Mobile carriers are shutting down their 3G networks to make room for more advanced network services, including 5G. As a result, many older cell phones and other mobile devices will be unable to use data services.

Once a 3G network is no longer supported, it is highly unlikely that any ELDs that rely on that network will be able to meet the minimum requirements established by the ELD Technical Specifications, including recording all required data elements and transferring ELD output files.

Therefore, any ELD that requires 3G cellular connectivity to perform its functionality will no longer be in compliance with the technical specifications in the ELD rule after the 3G network it relies on is sunset. When in an area that does not support 3G, a 3G device will register a malfunction. In accordance with 49 CFR 395.34, the carrier has 8 days to get the malfunction resolved, in this case by replacement, unless an extension is granted.

The announced sunset dates are below.* These are dates for completing the shutdowns. Mobile carriers are planning to retire parts of their networks sooner.

- AT&T 3G: February 22, 2022
- Sprint 3G (T-Mobile): March 31, 2022
- Sprint LTE (T-Mobile): June 30, 2022
- T-Mobile 3G: July 1, 2022
- Verizon 3G: December 31, 2022

Note: Many other carriers, such as Cricket, Boost, Straight Talk, and several Lifeline mobile service providers, utilize the AT&T, Verizon, and T-Mobile networks.

*Sunset dates are subject to change. Contact your mobile carrier for up-to-date information.

What actions do motor carriers need to take?

Confirm whether your ELD relies on a 3G network

If you are unsure if your ELD relies on a 3G network, contact your ELD provider. If your ELD does not rely on 3G, and meets all minimum requirements, no further action is needed.

Ask your provider for their upgrade or replacement plan.

If your ELD relies on a 3G network, ask your ELD provider about their plan for upgrading or replacing your device to one that will be supported after the 3G sunset, and complete the necessary actions as soon as possible.

The earliest announced sunset completion date is February 22, 2022. See all announced dates listed above and plan accordingly to avoid service disruptions and compliance issues. FMCSA strongly encourages motor carriers to take the above actions as soon as possible to avoid compliance issues, as portions of carrier 3G networks will be unsupported in advance of the announced sunset dates.
